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Evening Mile: The Paintings of Julika Lackner

17 nocturnal landscapes featuring meditative views of Southern California

Exhibition Dates: January 29-May 1, 2022 Forest Lawn Museum, Forest Lawn-Glendale

GLENDALE, CA—*Evening Mile: The Paintings of Julika Lackner* will open on January 29 at Forest Lawn Museum. The exhibition features 17 nocturnal landscapes that offer meditative views of Southern California. These works of art transform cityscapes, rolling hills, and coastlines into kaleidoscopic vistas.

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Lackner's expertise in landscape painting stretches back more than a decade, but the primary focus of *Evening Mile* is a series of artworks she began in the early days of the coronavirus pandemic. Forced to curtail her travels in March 2020, Lackner turned her attention to her immediate surroundings. Working from her home and studio in the hills of Eagle Rock, she was able to capture elevated views of the heart of Los Angeles. Lackner combines an abstract use of form and color with meticulous observations of the world around her. The resulting paintings transform familiar locales into scintillating scenes, which are dominated by contrasts of natural and artificial light.

The earliest painting featured in *Evening Mile* dates to 2005, while several of the artworks were created as recently as late 2021. One of the newest paintings depicts a view from the hilltop promontory of Forest Lawn Museum, which overlooks the surrounding neighborhoods of Glendale and nearby Griffith Park. Lackner paints in a variety of media, including oil, acrylic, and watercolor, all of which are featured in the exhibition. Born in Berlin, Germany, Lackner received her M.F.A. in 2006 from Art Center College of Design in Pasadena and her B.A. in 2001 from the University of California, Santa Barbara.

Forest Lawn Museum Director James Fishburne, PhD says, "Landscape painting is a tradition that dates back thousands of years and spans numerous cultures. Lackner builds on these traditions while breaking new ground. She's able to capture the surreal sunsets of Southern California, while making them feel both new and immediate."

Lackner says, "Many of these paintings were conceived during a time of isolation, so it's exciting to share them with the public. Even during the toughest times, the paintings were meant to create connections and foster a sense of community. We were separated, but we were all in it together."

Evening Mile: The Paintings of Julika Lackner will be on display at Forest Lawn Museum from January 29 through May 1, 2022. ABOUT FOREST LAWN MUSEUM

Forest Lawn Museum first opened in 1952 and is now comprised of three galleries and a gift shop as well as a renowned permanent collection of statuary, stained glass windows, mosaics, and architecture that is spread across Forest Lawn's six Southern California locations. Forest Lawn's founder, Dr. Hubert Eaton, wrote in his Builder's Creed that our park should be "a place where artists study and sketch; where school teachers bring happy children to see the things they read of in books." In that spirit, selections of Forest Lawn Museum's permanent collection of photographs, paintings, and bronze and marble statues by a range of nineteenth- and twentieth-century European and American artists are on display in the museum's front gallery. The museum typically dedicates two galleries to world-class rotating exhibits, which focus on topics ranging from the FIFA World Cup to the art of Pablo Picasso and Henri Matisse.

Forest Lawn Museum is located adjacent to the Hall of Crucifixion-Resurrection, which houses *The Crucifixion*, a 195-foot wide by 45-foot high painting by Polish artist Jan Styka, and *The Resurrection*, a painting by American artist Robert Clark. Other notable pieces in Forest Lawn's collection can be found in the Great Mausoleum, including the *Last Supper* stained glass window by artist Rosa Caselli-Moretti, the *Poets' Windows*, and marble replicas of Michelangelo's *Moses* and *Pietà*.
